Mr. Bombardier was an inventor and businessman. He was born in Valcourt, Quebec, Canada on April 16th, 1907. He died on February 18th, 1964 in Sherbrooke, Quebec, Canada. Joseph was honored by the Canadian Government with his photo on a postage stamp in the

year 2000. In 1937, in Quebec, Autoroute 55 (a Canadian Highway) was named Autoroute Joseph-Armand Bombardier between Sanstead and Autoroute 20.

He also has a glacier in Antarctica that is named Joseph-Armand Bombardier. He is known for being the founder of Bombardier which is a company that makes snowmobiles and jet skis. He did not just invent the snowmobile, though he also created the B-12 Snowbus. He is also a member of the Canadian Science and Engineering Hall of Fame. A gentleman named Roger Lacasse


wrote a biography on Joseph in 1988 titled Joseph-Armand Bombardier: An Inventor's Dream Come True.

ROBOTECH ~ STILL FLYING HIGH AFTER ALL THESE YEARS

"All fighters, scramble, I repeat, scramble"! Robotech is a sci-fi cartoon series that was first featured in 1985.

Robotech is a movie that is set on Earth and throughout space. Robotech was created by Carl Macek and Steve Kramer. There were 3 seasons to the Robotech chronicles. Those seasons names were Robotech: The Macross Saga, Robotech: The Robotech Masters and the final one is Robotech: The New Generation. The seasons include 3 different armies. The 1st consisted of the Super Dimension Fortress or the SDF-1. The 2nd season consisted of The Southern Cross Army, and the 3rd season consisted of the Genesis Climber MOSPEADA.

The Robotech franchise has also consisted of 5 officially licensed video games. But there will only be 2 listed. There would have been an earlier game from 1998, but the games producer, GameTek, went under and cancelled the release. The earliest game came in 2002. That

game was Robotech: Battlecry. Robotech: Battlecry is placed in the Macross Era. This game was formatted for the Microsoft XBOX, the Sony PlayStation 2, and the Nintendo Game-Cube. The 2nd game released was Robotech: The Macross Saga. This game was also released in 2002. This game was only formatted for the Gameboy Advance.

The Robotech series has a variety of futuristic airplanes and vehicles for the 2 armies. A major plane is the VF-1 Valkyrie. There are 3 modes for the Veritech fighters. These modes are Battloid mode, which is a robot form standing over 100 feet tall, Guardian mode, which is a combination of a robot and plane, and, finally, Fighter mode, which is a jet mode and one of the fastest of the three. The VF-1 Valkyrie is the fighter which most RDF (Robotech Defense Force) pilots are assigned to.

The Robotech series has 5 main enemies. In the 1st season, it has 2 enemies. Those enemies are the Maeltraeni and the Zentraedi, which are towering 100-foot-tall monsters from an alien species. In the 2nd season, the enemy is the Robotech Masters,



which are the creators of the aliens and Robotech machines, and the 3rd are the Invid, which is an extremely advanced alien species.

If this reader loves sci-fi movies, try watching Robotech. This reporter loves to watch Robotech and hopes this reader likes it too.

The Western Meadowlark is as big as a robin, but it is chunkier than the robin and it has a shorter, spiky tail. It also has a flat head, a slender bill, and a round shouldered

posture . Its wings are small and rounded for a bird of its size. It has a range from north

and south western sea board across the Great Plains. They have a yellow breast with a black V on it. Its feathers change to gray with brown stripes in winter, with a light buffed head. The behavior of the Western Meadowlark is it usually forages on the ground alone, and in winter it flies in small flocks. When flying, the Western Meadowlark glides low. It perches on high points such as telephone poles and fence posts.

It lives in the open native grasslands. Also it lives in agricultural fields for breading and foraging. But before you go looking, look in mediumheight fields instead of tall fields. The range is from southern Canada to central Mexico and in northern America and southern Canada during summer. It stays in central United States for summer breeding. While we are all bundled up, the Western Meadowlark is in the southern United States and central Mexico.

Once again this subject is complicated, but you probably understand it a little bit better. Hopefully voters remember who the key players were in the government shutdown and don't vote for them again.




November Survey ~ Feast Favorites
